JOIN US AS WE CELEBRATE SUCCESS

Congratulations! Convocation is the culmination of an academic journey of learning and discovery. We celebrate with a highly ceremonial occasion that is filled with tradition, ritual and symbolism. This reflects the honour and heritage that are associated with an academic education and with a Brandon University degree.

BRANDON UNIVERSITY'S DISTINGUISHED HISTORY

Brandon College was founded in 1899, and the history of higher education in the Brandon area can be traced back even earlier. In 1871, the signing of Treaty 2 permitted the settling of areas that are the traditional home of the Dakota, Anishanabek, Oji-Cree, Cree, Dene, and Red River Métis peoples. Soon thereafter, early Baptist missionaries founded a small college in Rapid City. In 1890, the McKee Academy followed the railroad to Brandon.

Brandon College absorbed McKee Academy in 1899 and began instruction that year. In 1900, the original Brandon College building was constructed, followed by Clark Hall as a women's residence in 1906 and then a next-door Science Building. The institution weathered economic downturns and two world wars to thrive and prosper.

Brandon University received its charter on June 5, 1967, on the occasion of a royal visit. The charter itself was dated July 1, 1967, to mark Canada's Centennial. Brandon University shares this anniversary with a number of other Canadian universities.

Prior to its chartering, students at Brandon College received degrees from other institutions. The first class to receive Brandon University degrees graduated in May 1968. In recent decades, Brandon University has continued to expand, and now boasts five faculties and schools, as well as several burgeoning graduate programs.

UNIVERSITY COAT OF ARMS

Steeped in the deeply symbolic meanings of heraldry, the Brandon University Coat of Arms was originally drawn in 1948 for Brandon College. The full heraldic achievement, including coat of arms, crest, mantling and motto, is reserved for highly ceremonial use, including occasions such as Convocation and Presidential Installation ceremonies.

On the coat of arms, which decorate the shield portion, the two open books represent both the learning and the arts of humankind. The wheat sheaf below represents the bounty of the earth, and takes on special resonance in the Wheat City. The lit antique lamp represents life and spirituality.

Above, the crest is what sits atop the helmet. Brandon University's crest is the mythological phoenix: a bird that was fabled to live for hundreds of years in the desert, then to burn itself to ashes in a funeral pyre before emerging from the ashes with renewed life to live. The phoenix represents immortality.

Underneath, the motto is taken from the Bible, Ephesians IV:15. Translated from Greek, "Aletheuontes de en Agape" means "Speaking the truth in love" and it reminds all members of the Brandon University community of our twin responsibilities of honesty and respect.

Brandon University's current, modern logo is based on a simplified version of the coat of arms.



CEREMONIAL OBJECTS



MIGIZII MITIK - EAGLE STAFF

Brandon University has been honoured to be presented with a migizii mitik, or Eagle Staff, which will help the university include a new Indigenous element in important ceremonial occasions and celebrations like Convocation

William Mousseau, an Anishanaabek artisan from Ebb and Flow First Nation, created the Eagle Staff out of natural elements with spiritual significance and symbolic value to the university as well as to Indigenous communities in the region.

The staff is about five feet tall, with a curve at the top, and made from a young tamarack tree. Tamarack was traditionally used in many plains tipis and grows naturally straight; this staff has rare twisted fiber growth, which adds unique character. Wrapped around the wood is deer leather near the bottom, and river otter fur along most of the length of the staff.

In the centre of the curve is an inclusive version of the traditional medicine wheel, painted on both sides of a two-sided leather shield.

Five bald eagle feathers are strung from the top of the staff, one for each faculty at Brandon University. The feathers are white, meaning they are from more mature eagles, and they symbolize knowledge and community. Tucked behind the feathers is a medicine bag with tobacco, sage, and cedar and sweet grass inside.

From the side of the staff, a large banner projects out, featuring the Brandon University logo, name, and graphic elements like the chevron on both sides. The beaded logo, the chevron, and the lettering in the BU name, were all created by hand, as was every part of the staff.

Finally, from the side of the banner, 10 bundles of horsehair are attached, representing the history of plains horsemen. Other elements, like eagle plumes and small, black-tipped feathers, both located on the center shield, have been added decoratively.

The Eagle Staff is given a place of honour during important BU ceremonies. At Convocation, it is carried in earliest in the procession, held by the BU Chancellor, and the Eagle Staff serves to officially open the proceedings.



The Brandon University Mace, handcarved in Malawi of African king ebony, is a kandodo, or walking stick, traditionally carried by a chief to signify authority.

The kandodo was a gift to Brandon University from Domasi College of Education in Malawi, where Brandon University had a six-year project to train secondary school teachers.



LECTERN

For more than a century, this historic lectern has been a central part of Convocation ceremonies. Originally donated by students at McMaster University around 1900 to mark the founding of Brandon College, for many years the lectern was also used in the College Chapel.



GONFALON

A gonfalon is a long flag or banner suspended from a crossbar on a pole that dates to medieval Italy as a symbol of state or office.

Brandon University first adopted a gonfalon in 2009 to increase the ceremonial aspects of Convocation. In 2019, new faculty-specific gonfalons were also introduced.



CHAIRS

The two ornate wooden chairs are symbols of the authority of the Chancellor and the President. The Chancellor's chair was presented by the Class of 1927, while the President's chair was donated by a number of faculty and staff to commemorate the service of Dr. John Mallea, BU President and Vice-Chancellor from 1985-90.

ORIGINS OF THE ACADEMIC REGALIA

The distinctive cap, gown and hood of the present-day academic regalia is known worldwide to represent academic achievement. The style, believed to have originated at Oxford and Cambridge Universities in the 1300s, derived from the common religious and academic garb of the time. As universities passed from ecclesiastical control, brighter colours began to distinguish the academic robe from more modest clerical gowns. Until as recently as a century ago, some universities decreed academic dress be worn throughout the year, whenever attending lectures or classes, although they are now generally reserved for special occasions like Convocation.

In Canada today, academic regalia continues to be based on the British tradition, but each university establishes its own style and colours. Brandon University determines particular hood colours to mark different degrees, although many follow larger traditions.

The tassel affixed to the top of the mortarboard cap also holds a special significance. During Convocation, graduands will move their tassels from the right-hand to the left-hand side, symbolizing the moment of their graduation.

Of the regalia's three components, the hood is the most interesting. Originally it had three uses: as a head covering, as a shoulder cape, and as a bag in which alms could be collected. It is mentioned as early as 1480 in clerical literature. However, when large wigs were in vogue in Britain, the cape part of the hood was split in front and a narrow neckband inserted. The entire cape and hood was allowed to fall back as it is today, and it was never restored to the original style.



ANNUAL ARTWORK

Convocation continues a recent tradition this year, with the commissioning of a unique piece of artwork to mark the year. A print of the year's art is included as part of the parchment package that is presented to each graduate as they cross the stage and that will be mailed to graduates unable to join in person.

This tradition was first inspired by our efforts to craft a special and meaningful experience during Virtual Convocations in 2020 and 2021. Over the past three years, we have presented a print of the Brandon University campus by famed plein air painter and BU alumnus Weiming Zhao, a piece of art that represented graduates breaking free from video calling apps by noted comics illustrator and BU employee, Curt Shoultz, and a transition watercolour of the Kavanagh Courtyard, representing an easing of pandemic restrictions, by lifelong Brandon resident Grace Buitenhuis. Each piece is inspired by the year that was.


One of the most dramatic additions to campus during the 2022–23 year was the installation of the soaring "Healing Together" Reconciliation sculpture across from the Healthy Living Centre, home of Convocation. We turned to sculptor Kevin McKenzie, who is also an instructor in BU's IshKaabatens Waasa Gaa Inaabateg Department of Visual Art, to help us find a student who could capture an interpretation of the piece.

Artist Kaelin Grill is a current student of McKenzie's, and this piece is directly influenced by the sculpture.

Kaelin's piece depicts a Mother Earth type figure who is sewing a tear in their dress that fades into a river. Like the sculpture, which reminds many viewers of sewing a ripped seam, this piece highlights the process of Reconciliation, of repairing broken ties. It also echoes crafting practices like kintsugi and sashiko, which are about how the time and care to fix something make it more valuable while emphasizing previous breakages.

A warm colour palette draws from the Prairie landscape, while the shape of the river recalls the void in the sculpture itself. Meanwhile, the braided hair of the sewing figure is an element drawn directly from Mamaawii-atooshke aakihkiwiin, the Brandon University Strategic Plan, where a braid is the central image.

As our annual art presentation becomes a cherished tradition, we are creating an important collection of artwork that reflects each year at BU, and we are actively looking for the right place to proudly display it permanently. We hope each graduate finds a special place for their print as well.







SENATE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH (TIER 1)

MEGUMI MASAKI

Megumi Masaki is a pianist, multimedia artist, educator and curator. For over 30 years, she has established an international reputation as a leading interpreter of Canadian and new music. Her work explores new models of interaction and integration of sound, image, text and movement in multimedia works through new technologies, expanding the possibilities of human expression. As a Japanese-Canadian artist, her work is also connected deeply to building community, acting on Truth and Reconciliation calls to action, and how human rights and environmental issues can be communicated through music and multimedia performances.



SENATE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

NICHOLAS WATIER

Dr. Nicholas Watier is an experimental psychologist with expertise in quantitative methods and visual perception. He obtained his PhD in Psychology from the University of Ottawa in 2012. He is currently an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at Brandon University, where he has taught courses in statistics, perception, and the history of psychology since 2014.

Prior to joining BU, Nicholas was an instructor at Laurentian University, where he was nominated for Outstanding Teacher of the Year. At BU, his commitment to teaching merited an appointment as a Teaching Affiliate with the Centre for

Megumi's collaborations with composers, visual artists, writers, choreographers and scientists have resulted in the creation of 74 original works and she has premiered over 180 works worldwide. She has released three documentary films and 15 CD, DVD, LP and digital recordings. Megumi is featured at major festivals and venues worldwide.

Megumi is a Professor at BU's School of Music and director of the New Music Ensemble and New Music Festival.

A highly regarded teacher, Megumi is also on faculty at the Banff Centre, Chetham's International Summer School UK, Musiktage am Rhein Germany, and the Casalmaggiore International Music Festival Italy. Committed to an inclusive Canadian music community, she is also an elected member of several boards.

Megumi has been appointed as a Member of the Order of Manitoba and elected as a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada.

Teaching, Learning, and Technology, and in 2017, his students successfully nominated him for the Brandon University Alumni Association's Excellence in Teaching Award.

He attributes his accomplishments as an educator to the exemplary professors that inspired him when he was a student. They instilled a conviction that knowledge is created, not transmitted. His teaching philosophy places a high value on personal discovery, as he believes that his role as an educator is not to simply transmit his expertise, but to provide students with the opportunity to develop their own insights. This is often accomplished by offering resistance to students' intuitive and preliminary understanding of the material—by offering more questions than answers. In doing so, students confront the limitations of their existing knowledge structures and revise them, enabling their knowledge to progress.

BUAA EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

SHELLEY KOKORUDZ

Dr. Shelley Kokorudz is an Associate Professor in the Department of Educational Psychology & Student Services in the Faculty of Education. She has been an educator since graduating with her Bachelor of Education degree in 1985.

Prior to her employment at Brandon University, which began 10 years ago, Shelley received her master's degree from BU and was a teacher in the K-12 school system, teaching all grades from 2 to 12. She was also a principal and now shares her experiences with pre-service teachers. She completed her PhD in 2020 and is developing a research agenda around nature-based approaches to teaching and learning.

Shelley is a strong advocate for inclusion of all learners. She is very involved with the university's PENT program, focusing on the education of Indigenous pre-service teachers. She enjoys teaching courses in spring and summer when PENT students are on campus. Her passion reflects her desire to see all students be excited about learning by focusing on the abilities and interests of all learners. This excitement begins with compassionate, confident teachers who believe in children and work to inspire them through their commitment to excellence. Shelley remains faithful to the development of 'teacher heroes' who teach 'outside' ordinary boxes because there is no such thing as an 'ordinary' child.

When she is not teaching, Shelley enjoys spending time with her family, playing her violin and riding her horses. She is humbled to receive this award today.







DISTINGUISHED TEACHER AWARD

JEFF MCPHERSON

Jeff McPherson graduated from Brandon University in 2010 with a B.Mus/B.Ed concurrent degree. He is now the full-time music teacher at Wayoata Elementary School in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Jeff has worked with a small team of other music teachers, curricular consultants, and assistant superintendents over the past six years to implement a division wide technology integration program in River East Transcona School Division and is currently the teacher leader for technology integration in elementary music. In 2020, Jeff completed the Microsoft Innovative Educator Certificate (MIE) and the MIE Trainer Academy. Through the lens of 21st century teaching/learning, he continues to provide professional development at the school and divisional level as a member of the Digital Literacy Leadership team. He

has been a ukulele clinician at TEMPO (Manitoba Music Educators Conference), DECAPO at Brandon University, and, most recently, at Intersections 2022 (National Orff Educators Conference). Education conferences are not the only way Jeff shares his love of teaching music with others. He also runs a YouTube channel (@MessyDeskConcerts) with hundreds of lessons, song arrangements and fun activities for music teachers to use in their classrooms. Jeff regularly conducts divisional choirs with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. In 2017, his medley of classic Canadian favorites, co-arranged with Neil Weisensel for Canada 150, was performed in an evening concert by the WSO and 230 Grade Five students. His school groups have performed at Manitoba Music Month and at the Manitoba Legislature Open House. Most importantly, Jeff is fortunate to be married to another wonderful music teacher and is a proud dad of two great kids!



DISTINGUISHED TEACHER AWARD

JUSTIN ROWE

Justin was born and raised in Brandon and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from Brandon University in 2016. He went on to complete his Bachelor of Education at Brandon University, graduating in 2018. 

INDIGENOUS INFLUENCE

While the legacy of Brandon University, Brandon College and our forerunner institutions dates back more than one hundred years to the late 19th century, the history of knowledge-keeping in this area draws on thousands of years of Indigenous traditions. Today, Brandon University is proud to celebrate our home in Treaty 2 and Treaty 1 territory, the traditional territory of Anishinaabek, Cree, Oji-Cree, Assiniboine, Dakota, and Dene peoples, and the homeland of the Red River Métis Nation.

Our commitment to Indigenous services and Indigenous education was formalized as early as 1975 when we became the first university in western Canada (and only the second in Canada) to establish a Native Studies Department. Our engagement with First Nations, Red River Métis and Inuit programming continues today, and we have a firmly renewed commitment to reconciliation.

Beginning this year, Convocation is graced with the inclusion an Eagle Staff, or migizii mitik, which is carried in a place of honour to lead the procession. The Eagle Staff indicates the official beginning and conclusion of Convocation. The ceremonies also include greetings from an elder or knowledge-keeper, as well as a traditional honour song.


ACKNOWLEDGMENTS
