Master of Psychiatric Nursing Becoming a Reality

The Department of Psychiatric Nursing has developed a proposal for a Masters' degree in Psychiatric Nursing (M.P.N.). Decision-makers, employers, practitioners and consumers have all indicated strong support for the program.

The M.P.N. program has been specifically designed with practicing psychiatric nurses in mind. The program will:

 Build on strength – Brandon University has been a pioneer in psychiatric nursing education, establishing the first post-diploma degree in psychiatric nursing in Canada in 1986 and the first 4 year undergraduate degree in 1995.

- Draw on expertise from across the country

 The faculty complement at Brandon University will be extended through partnership with individuals who are leaders in psychiatric nursing and with educational institutions offering relevant courses.
- Tailor education to student interest The Master of Psychiatric Nursing program offers streams in advanced clinical practice, administration, and education. Each stream offers substantial opportunity to pursue a focus of professional interest.

First Nations and Aboriginal Counselling Program Becomes a Department of the School of Health Studies

The School of Health Studies is pleased to announce that the First Nations and Aboriginal Counselling (FNAC) Program has officially become a Department of the School of Health Studies. This change took place in September of this year. The Department of First Nations and Aboriginal Counselling joins the Department of Psychiatric Nursing and the Department of Nursing. This is an exciting time for the Faculty and students of all three Departments as the Dean and Faculty look forward to working together and to more changes in the future.

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A Message from the Dean

In Pursuit of Quality Education and a Positive Learning Environment

The start of another academic year is an exciting time in the School of Health Studies. Students and faculty are back in the classrooms, skills labs, and clinical areas. There is much anticipation of the new year and what lies ahead. The School is embarking on many initiatives that will have positive impacts upon the education of

our students, professional practice, and the health of citizens of Manitoba. I am pleased to share that the First Nation and Aboriginal Counselling (FNAC) program joined the School of Health Studies in June 2009. Under the leadership of Andrea Hinch-Bourns, Acting Director of F.N.A.C., the program is embarking upon a transitional year with plans for curricular revisions, program improvements, and renaming of the academic credential. We have established a Program Advisory Committee which includes employers, elders, students, faculty, and graduates of the program. This committee will provide ongoing consultation, collaboration, and advice on program development, implementation, and evaluation. It is an important component of a newly restructured and rejuvenated program.

We have established a proposal to the provincial government for a Master in Psychiatric Nursing program. This will be the first of its kind in Canada and will be based upon a strong foundation of expertise and experience in Psychiatric Nursing at Brandon University. We anticipate a favourable response from the government and enrolling the first students in the fall of 2010.

Enrolment in School of Health Studies programs has increased by approximately 20% this academic year. A concerted effort to attract more applicants and recruit more students was quite successful. The School has been "rebranded" with the slogan *Care to make a Difference? Join us in Health Studies*.

The School is piloting a new clinical supervision model that includes hiring part time clinical teachers who also continue to be employed in their respective health care agencies. This model has served to create a bridge between education and practice by ensuring our clinical teachers are grounded in the realities of practice. It also assists the School in meeting the needs of our increasing student population.

This summer we received positive news from the College of Psychiatric Nurses of Manitoba and the College of Registered Nurses of Manitoba that our B.Sc.P.N. and B.N. programs received maximum lengths of approval. This is a testament to the quality of programming and instruction that our students in Health Studies have grown accustomed to.

In summary, Health Studies is a vibrant place to work and attend school. Pursuing quality education and creating positive learning environments are goals we will continue to pursue throughout the years to come.

- Facilitate application of theory to practice Each of the required courses in each stream will include practice time.
- Facilitate program access The program is designed to meet the needs of adult learners, many of whom are currently employed as psychiatric nurses. Access is facilitated through an option to study on a part-time basis, prior learning assessment, transfer credit and distributed learning.
- Contribute to meeting market needs Advanced practice psychiatric nurses, health care managers and psychiatric nursing educators are all in high demand.

The M.P.N. program is designed for students who are seeking advanced practice roles in psychiatric nursing. Foundational courses in advanced practice are complemented by a focus on a selected stream. Streams are offered in advanced clinical practice, administration and education. The streams are supported by research courses which, when combined with content from the selected stream, will enable graduates to evaluate current practice and contribute to innovation in service delivery. Graduates will be prepared to be leaders in psychiatric nursing and health care. Graduates will also be prepared to undertake doctoral study.

The program consists of 33 credit hours and includes a thesis requirement. Each student's program of study will be tailored to his or her interests and learning objectives. Tailoring of the program will occur through selection of a focus for the two courses in the chosen stream and an elective course specific to the student's area of interest. Demonstration of advanced knowledge and skill in clinical practice, administration, or education is incorporated into the program.

Development of the M.P.N. proposal has been in process since 2008. A statement of intent was submitted to the Council on Post-Secondary Education (COPSE) in the fall of 2008 and, in March 2009, the School of Health Studies was invited to submit a full proposal. The full proposal has been approved by the Department of Psychiatric Nursing, Health Studies Faculty Council, and most recently by Brandon University Board of Governors. The full proposal was submitted to C.O.P.S.E. at the end of October 2009.

Student Nurse Takes To The Air

Chris Van De Woestyne Third Year Nursing Student

Nursing Practice VI (N.P. VI) is the consolidated 3 week experience at the end of the third year of the Nursing Program. My N.P.VI took place April/May 2009. During this clinical experience I was fortunate to participate in flight nursing with FastAir Medevac from Winnipeg. This type of flight nursing involves flying into remote communities in the north and transporting patients to larger centers of care such as Winnipeg or Thompson. The reason for transport is due to the patient being at a level of acuity that cannot be safely dealt with at the northern hospital or nursing station.

I chose to pursue this experience because I have lived in the north and my wife is a flight nurse. I had heard of the challenges and adventures that are part of this career and I believed they would fit well with the goals to be achieved in N.P.VI. I also felt this type of nursing experience would fit well with my goals as a student and where I was in my personal development. I have been an L.P.N. for 13 years and many of the practice environments I have seen as a B.N. student are quite familiar to me. I wanted to pursue an experience that would truly push me to expand my current knowledge base. Here is an excerpt from my own final evaluation.

Being in this new environment did take me well out of my comfort zone. Also, being the first B.U. student flight nurse brought with it some anxiety as well as some honor. It was certainly a goal of mine to set the bar high and perform at the top of my game. I do not feel that this would be an experience that everyone would enjoy. You are away from home, work very long hours (the clinical component for N.P.VI was 120 hours; we fulfilled this in under 9 days), you have to be aware of your personal safety when at the reserves/nursing stations, you also have the safety of the crew to consider when you accept these patients and their escorts. Last but not least, you need to be very

confident in your skill and ability. In this case you were working for a private company who has to make a profit. Good PR is vital

for them to continue to succeed. I must say that I was totally exhausted at the end of this experience...but it was fantastic!!!

The diversity of this experience was one of the highlights a flight nursing

placement. During these 9 days we transported 14 patients, did approximately 30 different flight legs. The mode of transport included planes, helicopters, vans, trucks, ambulances, and even a hovercraft...it was awesome!! We flew all over Manitoba from Lac Brochet to Shamattawa and many points between. The range of patients that I provided care to was extensive. Another excerpt from my journal reads: My range of skills over the past few weeks covered the map. We transferred 14 patients. We had palliative, several pediatric, cancer, orthopedic, overdose/ psychiatric, ETOH/chest pain, fractures in young and old, and one call that due to level of acuity, we did not transport after doing a thorough assessment. That patient required the services of lifeflight, an advanced team of nurses and doctors...

This adventure has certainly had a lasting impact on my personal and professional life. I believe it is hard to gain a full appreciation of the obstacles **continued on next page**

The Western Region Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (W.R.C.A.S.N.) founded in 1969 is an affiliate body of the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (C.A.S.N.). Through W.R.C.A.S.N. members are provided with opportunities to examine beliefs, ideas, and concerns regarding nursing and nursing education. All Brandon University School of Health Studies Faculty are able to register for membership in this organization. There are several reasons why membership in W.R.C.A.S.N. is important to the Brandon University Faculty within the Bachelor of Nursing and Bachelor of Science in Psychiatric Nursing programs. W.R.C.A.S.N. serves as an excellent forum for networking, sharing in the interchange of nursing education knowledge and the promotion of research in nursing education. As well, members from the School of Health Studies have input into the regional representation of views regarding issues of import concerning university nursing education and the profession.

In mid-winter, February 19-21, 2009 W.R.C.A.S.N. held their Annual Conference and General Meeting in Calgary, Alberta. On behalf of Brandon University's School of Health Studies, Assistant Professor Jane Karpa, in her role as member-at-large, attended the conference entitled: Teaching from Within: Supporting Nurse Educators for the Future. The conference theme was well reflected in the chosen concurrent sessions, with topics such as: reflective teaching practices; diversity and culture within nursing education; supporting clinical teaching; building teaching common communities; and tools for building scholarship being presented. The keynote speaker was Dr. Florence Myrick, Professor Faculty of Nursing,

University of Alberta. Dr. Myrick spoke eloquently on "Social Justice Nursing – Fostering a Climate of Critique", calling for a nursing education environment that is respectful and critically reflective.

During the conference, representatives from the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing presented an update, regarding the first draft of the White Paper stemming from the inaugural Nursing Education Summit in 2008, to the W.R.C.A.S.N. executive and membersat-large. This White Paper will outline an action plan to address the summit recommendations on redesigning nursing education to satisfy population health needs and support health human resources planning across Canada.

Ms Karpa was honored with an invitation to become a member of the W.R.C.A.S.N. Executive Committee. In consultation with the Dean of the School of Health Studies, Ms Karpa's first official task was to request Brandon

University School of Health Studies be placed on the Rotation of Officers for W.R.C.A.S.N. Over the years ahead, Brandon University School of Health Studies will have representation in the positions of President, Secretary-Treasurer, and Vice President. Brandon University is proud of its long history in nursing and psychiatric nursing education and as the future of scholarly nursing education and research is on a precipice of change, it is very important Brandon University School of Health Studies have a strong voice in promoting the advancement of nursing education and nursing scholarship in Western Canada.

On October 19th, Dr. Renee Will was privileged to present a workshop at the Canadian Hospice and Palliative Care Association Annual Conference in Winnipeg MB. She was joined in the presentation by two third year students from the Bachelor of Science in Psychiatric Nursing program, Elizabeth Redfern and Kelly Will. They were both students in the course 69:272 Introduction to Palliative Care taught by Dr. Will in January 2009.

The presentation given by Dr. Will was entitled, "Reflection and Student Learning: Utilizing Journeys in Hospice Palliative Care in Nursing Education" and was followed by a one-hour workshop, co-facilitated by Dr. Will, Elizabeth and Kelly. The workshop gave interested health care professionals the opportunity to utilize writing stems and engage in journaling themselves. Ms Katherine (Kath) Murray, B.S.N., M.A., C.H.P.C.N.(C) designed the journal Journeys in Hospice Palliative Care, to help individuals gain an understanding of the increasingly deep body of hospice palliative care knowledge, theory and research, and to help individuals integrate their new knowledge into practice. Dr. Will used the journal in the course to stimulate reflection and critical thinking

about palliative care and the many complex experiences that students encounter as they begin their journey in this specialized area of psychiatric nursing care.

The workshop was well received as both students and professionals were given the opportunity to share experiences and thoughts surrounding death and dying and utilize their journal writing to reflect on their practice.

Dr. Will reports "I am so pleased to report that Elizabeth and Kelly were excellent ambassadors for the School of Health Studies, the Department of Psychiatric Nursing and the psychiatric nursing profession. They were professional, presented confidently and responded effectively to audience questions. They fielded questions about psychiatric nursing and their program, as some of the participants were from eastern Canada and less familiar with the profession, in a confident manner that led many to question why psychiatric nurses are not evident on palliative care teams. As this is something I have been promoting for some time, it was wonderful to have the students there to provide clear evidence of the contribution psychiatric nurses could make to palliative care services." On May 29, 2009, Brandon University's Health Studies Complex was officially named *The Dr. James & Mrs. Lucille Brown School of Health Studies*. This dedication was made in honour of the late Dr. Brown's long and distinguished career in the field of medicine and in recognition of his and Lucille's dedicated support to Brandon University.

James Brown was born in Brandon in 1923 and graduated from Brandon College in 1944 with a Bachelor of Science degree. He graduated from the University of Manitoba Medical School in 1949. He did specialized study in ear, nose and throat medicine at the University of London, England, and had a long and distinguished medical career taking him from London to New York, Los Angeles, and Calgary, Alberta. In 1955, Dr. Brown married Lucille Millions, who had trained as a Registered Nurse, achieving the General Proficiency Prize on graduation from Brandon General Hospital in 1952. They returned to Canada in 1956 to establish a medical practice in Calgary. It was here that they made their home and had their four children, sons John and David and daughters Maryann and Michelle. Together they opened an office which over time grew and became The Brown Clinic with a large staff of specialist doctors and support staff. Dr. Brown devoted the rest of his life to the surgical treatment of the deaf, doing over 30,000 operations, including the first successful case in Calgary in 1957. He was an active member of his profession, publishing numerous articles on his research into deafness and presenting his findings at academic conferences around the world. In 2004, on the 60th Anniversary of his graduation from Brandon College, he received the degree Doctor of Science (honoris causa) from Brandon University in recognition of his outstanding commitment to the

advancement of medical and surgical knowledge in his field and to his continued affiliation and contribution to Brandon University.

Dr. Brown was always active in the community in service club fundraising and other charitable causes, and he and Mrs. Brown were very generous to Brandon University, establishing the Dr. James and Mrs. Lucille Brown Bursary in Health Studies, and the Dr. James and Mrs. Lucille Brown Bursary in Music.

In 2006, Dr. Brown became a member of Brandon University Foundation. In December 2007, in recognition of their roots to the city of Brandon, and their close ties to Brandon College, Dr. Brown made a generous commitment for the development of sports medicine services within Brandon University's Healthy Living Centre.

Dr. James Brown passed away May 1, 2009 at the age of 86 years. Mrs. Brown continues to live in Calgary, Alberta.
