Context - Population

During the last census, Brandon's population increased 3 times more than the previous census.

Context - Population Demographics

2001 Census - 2.5% of the population identified as a visible minority.

2006 Census - 4% of population identified as a visible minority.



If projections are realized, visible minorities could increase to approximately 10+% by 2011 census.

Settlement Challenges

- Service provider's ability to keep pace with growth (staffing, space, hours of operation, funding processes, etc.)
- Limited language capacity in the community
- Tight housing market
- Language barriers
- Cultural differences
- Racism historical prejudices from home countries and local residents

Settlement Challenges

- Living in Canada while supporting families in their home country (emotional, financial, etc.)
- Reunification process
- Living in Canada once families arrive
- Youth integration
- Employment for family members
- Resentment from current residents re: resources allocated to immigrant population

Opportunities

Critical mass of immigrants has meant:

- ✓ Access to adequate settlement funding
- ✓ Community response to changes
- ✓ Increased language capacity developing
- ✓ Enhanced cultural opportunities / learning
- ✓ Declining school enrollment has been reversed
- Growing population
- National attention

- Statistics / projections
- Trends identify & educate
- Bridge between business & service providers
- Maintain a Neutral & broad picture perspective
- Champion an integrated community philosophy

Municipal Government Role

- Facilitate partnerships
- Labour market opinions (content for application / community validation)

- → Socio-economic impact studies
- → Housing supply & demand report annually
- → Stakeholder newsletter quarterly
- → Chair of the Immigrant Services Network Coordinating committee
- → Website section dedicated to Maple Leaf Foods

Lessons learned (Municipal perspective)

- Adopt an integrated neighbourhood philosophy
- Involve broad stakeholders from day one
- Make communication a priority, and as public as possible
- Consider impact on every aspect of community life
- Don't get bogged down in challenges
- Don't be afraid to make mistakes
- Coordination of programming is critical
