ABSTRACT

Youth unemployment is higher than unemployment of older individuals, and these higher rates are of concern to policy makers in many industrialized countries. Intersecting with the concern about employment levels among youth is a concern about youth outmigration from rural areas. This webinar positions these concerns in the context of employment trends in Canada. The nature of higher youth unemployment rates are highlighted, as not an idea of a new "crisis". Rates of youth unemployment differ in important ways among (a) rural as compared to urban youth, and (b) for "older" (20-24 year olds) versus "younger" (15-19 year olds) youth. Further, it is important to consider the impact of proximity to urban areas (Metropolitan Influence Zones) for rural youth when considering their employment patterns.
