



The Changing Nature of Rural: THE INTERNATIONAL CONTEXT

WHAT IS THE PROJECT?

Both external and internal forces greatly impact rural and remote communities on a daily basis. Whether because of corporate consolidations, shifts in natural resource sectors, or the inadequate updates to infrastructure as years go by. These impacts have only increased since the COVID-19 pandemic. A preliminary literature review has been conducted through Brandon University and the University of Winnipeg where six overarching themes reflective of specific challenges have been identified: aging populations, immigration and outmigration, reconciliation, economic development, infrastructure, and technology and the digital divide. This project will aim to identify deliberate components of each specific challenge so we can begin to address these challenges by means of community development projects.

WHO ARE THE PROJECT PARTNERS?

This initial exploration into the changing nature of rural will be conducted through the Rural Development Institute and the Canada Research Chair in Human and Environment Interaction at the University of Winnipeg.

WHY IS THIS PROJECT IMPORTANT?

This project will forge regional connections between municipal, governmental, business, and a broad cross-section of organizations and community groups from Manitoba's eastern and western rural regions. These connections will contribute to new regional rural research networks where then rural issues can be explored by experts and community needs can be addressed.
